IMPORTANT DATES ABOUT OLIVER GOLDSMITH:

1728: Born at Pallas Ballymahon, Co. Longford.

1730: Family moved to Lissoy Co Westmeath

1734: Attended Village School under Thomas Byrne.

1741: Sent to School at Edgeworthstown.

1744: Entered Trinity College Dublin as a sizar.

1749: Took Bachelor of Arts Degree.

1751: Rejected for orders by the Bishop of Elphin.

1752: Went to Edinburgh University to study medicine.

1754: He arrived in Leiden, Holland to continue studies of medicine.

1755: Left Leiden and took degree of Bachelor of Medicine at Louvain, Travelled on foot in France, Germany, Switzerland and Italy.

1756: Landed at Dover and settled in London.

1764: "The Traveller" published.

1766: "The Vicar of Wakefield" published.

1768: "The good Natured Man" published.

1770: "The Deserted Village" published.

1773: "She stoops to Conquer" published.

1774: Died April 4th and buried in the Temple aged 45.

1999: Memorial erected in Ballymahon.

2004: Goldsmith's Grave Rededicated.





Dr. Fergus O'Ferrall, is Lay Leader of The Methodist Church in Ireland, 2016-18; he is a historian and author of a number of books including *Catholic Emancipation Daniel O'Connell and The Birth of Irish Democracy 1820-30 (Dublin, 1985), Daniel O'Connell (2nd Edition, 1998). Citizenship And*

Public Service (Dundalgan Press, Dundalk, 2000). He is a native of Co.Longford and he has edited with Martin Morris, Longford History and Society (Dublin, 2010. He has been Adelaide Lecturer in Health Policy, Trinity College, Dublin, President of The National Youth Council of Ireland and Chair of The Wheel, the coordinating body of the community and voluntary sector. He is a Governor of The Irish Times. He is a contributor to the recently published A Dialogue Of Hope Critical Thinking For Critical Times ed.Gerry O'Hanlon SJ, (Messenger Publications, Dublin, 2017). He contributed to the 1985 and the 2009 Goldsmith International Literary Festivals.



Donall Mac An Bheatha, was born and bred in Clontarf, Dublin and received his Masters Planning Degree from University College Dublin. He has worked as Senior Planner in Longford for twenty years. He was responsible for the recent erection of the Longford

Literary Trail maps and signs in the County. Before that he worked in both Dublin and London. Recently returned from a 'cultural' tour of Goldsmiths haunts on Fleet Street, London. Donal found the visit both illuminating and inspiring.



John Connell, is an award-winning investigative journalist, author, playwright, producer and farmer. Author of the No 1 bestseller *The Cow Book, Connell farms* and writes in his native Longford. His journalism work has been published and broadcast worldwide

and been the recipient of numerous international awards including 2 walkleys, and a UN media prize. He ran his own production company in Australia and produced numerous documentaries for tv and online in the human rights area, his work lead to the freeing of Tamil refugees from wrongful detention by the Australian government. He is currently working on a theatre play for the Abbey and *The Cow Book* is to be the subject of an upcoming documentary.



Séamus Dooley, is Irish secretery of the National Union of Journalists in Ireland. A graduate of the College of commerce Rathmines, He served as a journalist with the Tullamore tribune before his appointment as Editor of the Roscommon Champion. Prior to

becoming a full-time trade union official Séamus worked as a sub editor at the Irish Independent. Educated at St Mary's Boys NS and St Saran's Secondary School, Ferbane Séamus inherited a love of Goldsmith's poetry from his late father. Visits to Goldsmith country remain a favourite childhood memory. An occasional contributor to Sunday Miscellany Séamus is a committee member of the Clé club traditional music club.

He will be working for the next several years on a new edition of the collected works of Oliver Goldsmith, also for Cambridge University Press.

teaching position in Ballymahon Vocational School. He moved to Longford Vocational school in 1980 as assistant principal. Eamon retired in 2009 after working as County Longford Home school Liaison Community Co-ordinator with County Longford V.E.C.



Brian Toolan, is a former London City Merchant Banker and now lectures in the Business Faculty at Athlone Institute of Technology. A keen amateur actor with Athlone Little Theatre, he is chairman of the RTÉ All-Ireland Drama Festival Fringe and organises an extensive programme of

art and photographic exhibitions, drama, film, poetry readings, children's performances, choral recitals, musical performances and even an arts and crafts and artisan food fair. He is originally from Galway and is married with three children.
